

• Land Area: 0.7 Square Miles

- City first founded in 1768 and named after Queen Charlotte Sophia
- Trade and Tryon established as first streets and remaining area divided into Four Wards
- 1775 Mecklenburg County
 Declaration of
 Independence signed






Population: 134,042

• Land Area: 29.8 Square Miles

- Streetcar systems cease (1938)
- Independence Boulevard (1946)
- I-85 opens (1958)
- I-77 begins (1965)






Population: 315,474

Land Area: 140.7 Square Miles

- Brooklyn Village "urban renewal" (1961)
- UNC-Charlotte opens in (1965)
- SouthPark mall opens (1970)
- 4th Ward revitalization begins (1975)
- Charlotte adds 100,000 new jobs in 10 years.






Population: 540,828

- ½ cent sales tax for transit passes (1998)



CDOT – Maintains 750 signals, 10,000 signs and 2,400 miles of paved roads












Job Growth and Unemployment

Occupations and Wages






- 1 in 3 jobs held by someone who lives outside the County




Median Household Income, 2012

Median Household Income: Charlotte and Peer Cities




Charlotte has the second highest median household income among five peer cities

Percentage of Persons Below the Poverty Level, 2012





Percentage of Persons Age 25+ with Bachelor's Degrees or Higher


Percentage of Persons Age 25+ with Bachelor's Degree or Higher, 2012













Population Growth, 2007-2013

Housing Type: Charlotte and Peer Cities




 Charlotte has the highest percentage of single family detached homes among five peer cities

Housing Units Built in Charlotte: 2000 to 2012




- Over 93,000 housing units were constructed in Charlotte between 2000 and 2012 at a ratio of 50% Multi-Family and 50% Single Family.
- Since 2007 the construction ratio has been 63% Multi-Family and 37% Single Family.

Population Density over time: Charlotte and Peer Cities




 Charlotte's density will have to increase to 3,285 persons per square mile to accommodate projected population growth by 2040.











Charlotte as an Emerging Immigrant Gateway
