## Visioning

### **Vision Guidelines**

Vision - A community based strategic planning effort in which citizens and staff work together to identify the kind of community that people who live, work, play, and do business in the Steele Creek area would like to see it become over the next 20 to 30 years. It's simply an image of what the area could be like in the future (in a positive light). It focuses on what is possible. This vision will help establish future direction and what will happen over many years. It will also be used to set priorities for capital projects, direct city services, and guide decisions impacting the community.

- Vision can be a statement or list of characteristics.
- Vision can be creative but should be grounded in reality.
- Vision needs to be achievable.

### **Visioning Considerations**

- 1. Considers opportunities and constraints identified by public.
- 2. Broad description of kind of community people who live, work and play in the area would like to see over the next 20 or 30 years.
- 3. Reflects the rich history, heritage, and environmental features of the Steele Creek area.
- 4. Addresses long range issues to help shape and direct plan goals while embracing Charlotte's broader community wide policies.
- 5. Guides community design.

### **Draft Vision Statements**

#### Option 1

The vision for the Steele Creek area is to create a unique and sustainable community that is a great place to live, work, and recreate, while preserving the community's character by incorporating natural and historic features into new development. The community will implement this vision through the following actions:

Protecting the Catawba River, McDowell Nature Preserve, natural features, and historic places;

Providing a balanced mixture of land uses with enhanced public facilities;

Developing a safe, accessible and efficient transportation system for pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users, and motorists;

Encouraging community design that recognizes the natural environment; and

Creating an interconnected network of parks, greenways, and open space amenities.

### Option 2

The vision for Steele Creek area is to create a unique and sustainable community that is great place to live while incorporating natural and historic features into new development to preserve the community's character.
