Rezoning Petition 14-012: Subject:

Approximately 13.15 acres located at the

intersection of Carnegie Boulevard and Congress Street on the west side of Barclay

Downs Drive.

CDOT has completed a review of the subject petition in order to ensure consistency with the Transportation Action Plan (TAP). The TAP seeks to ensure that Charlotte's transportation network supports current and future land uses and includes streets that provide safe and comfortable mobility for motorists, pedestrians, bicyclists, and transit users. Based on our review of the petition, we offer the following comments.

Vehicle Trip Generation

This site could generate approximately 9,750 trips per day as currently zoned. Under the proposed zoning the site could generate approximately 10,300 trips per day.

We have the following comments regarding apparent conflicts between the proposed rezoning and existing ordinances or policies:

We understand this this petition is regulated by the Subdivision Ordinance based on the proposed development being a multiple building site. As such, we also understand that the Subdivision Ordinance would require additional connectivity in the form of either a north/south or east/west public street. Irrespective of the Subdivision Ordinance requirements, CDOT recommends a pedestrian connection, which could be accomplished by a public street or public plaza that connects the internal private street to Congress Drive (Figure 1). CDOT will work with the petitioner and the Planning Department on this issue.

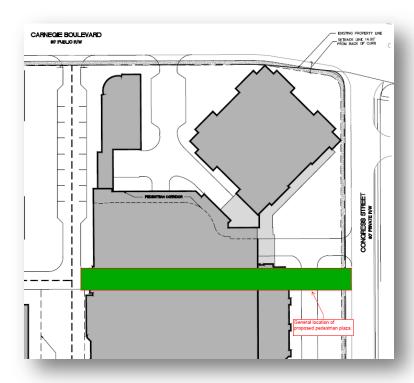

The following are requirements of the developer that must be satisfied prior to driveway permit approval. We recommend that the petitioner reflect these on the rezoning plan as-appropriate.

- 1. According to the City of Charlotte's Driveway Regulations, CDOT has the authority to regulate/approve all private street/driveway and public street connections to the right-of-way of a street under the regulatory jurisdiction of the City of Charlotte.
- 2. Adequate sight triangles must be reserved at the existing/proposed street entrances. All proposed trees, berms, walls, fences, and/or identification signs must not interfere with sight distance at the entrances. Such items should be identified on the site plan.
- 3. The proposed driveway connections to Carnegie Boulevard and Congress Street will require a driveway permits to be submitted to CDOT for review and approval. The exact driveway locations and type/width of the driveways will be determined by CDOT during the driveway permit process. The locations of the driveways shown on the site plan are subject to change in order to align with driveways on the opposite side of the street and comply with City Driveway Regulations and the City Tree Ordinance.
- 4. All proposed commercial driveway connections to a future public street will require a driveway permit to be submitted to CDOT for review and approval.
- 5. Any fence or wall constructed along or adjacent to any sidewalk or street right-of-way requires a certificate issued by CDOT.

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6. A Right-of-Way Encroachment Agreement is required for the installation of any non-standard item(s) (irrigation systems, decorative concrete pavement, brick pavers, etc.) within a proposed/existing City maintained street right-of-way by a private individual, group, business, or homeowner's/business association. An encroachment agreement must be approved by CDOT prior to the construction/installation of the non-standard item(s). Contact CDOT for additional information concerning cost, submittal, and liability insurance coverage requirements.
