Rezoning Petition 14-031: Approximately 5.9 acres located on the Subject:

> southeast corner at the intersection of Youngblood Road and Shelburne Farms

Drive.

CDOT has completed a review of the subject petition in order to ensure consistency with the Transportation Action Plan (TAP). The TAP seeks to ensure that Charlotte's transportation network supports current and future land uses and includes streets that provide safe and comfortable mobility for motorists, pedestrians, bicyclists, and transit users. Based on our review of the petition, we offer the following comments.

Vehicle Trip Generation

The site plan currently does not provide enough information to accurately estimate the existing trip generation. CDOT requests the petitioner provide the current entitlements for this parcel as specified in rezoning petition 2001-016(C). Under the proposed zoning the site could generate approximately 335 trips per day.

We have the following comments regarding apparent conflicts between the proposed rezoning and existing ordinances or policies:

1. We understand the Subdivision Ordinance will require the extension of the proposed public street to stub at the rear properly line at Parcel #217-071-27.

The following are requirements of the developer that must be satisfied prior to driveway permit approval. We recommend that the petitioner reflect these on the rezoning plan as-appropriate.

- 1. According to the City of Charlotte's Driveway Regulations, CDOT has the authority to regulate/approve all private street/driveway and public street connections to the right-of-way of a street under the regulatory jurisdiction of the City of Charlotte.
- 2. Adequate sight triangles must be reserved at the existing/proposed street entrance(s). Two 35' x 35' and two 10' x 70' sight triangles are required for the entrance(s) to meet requirements. All proposed trees, berms, walls, fences, and/or identification signs must not interfere with sight distance at the entrance(s). Such items should be identified on the site plan.

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- 3. All proposed commercial driveway connections to a future public street will require a driveway permit to be submitted to CDOT for review and approval.
- 4. Any fence or wall constructed along or adjacent to any sidewalk or street right-of-way requires a certificate issued by CDOT.
- 5. A Right-of-Way Encroachment Agreement is required for the installation of any non-standard item(s) (irrigation systems, decorative concrete pavement, brick pavers, etc.) within a proposed/existing City maintained street right-of-way by a private individual, group, business, or homeowner's/business association. An encroachment agreement must be approved by CDOT prior to the construction/installation of the non-standard item(s). Contact CDOT for additional information concerning cost, submittal, and liability insurance coverage requirements.

We anticipate that NCDOT will request the following, and recommend the Petitioner work directly with Mr. Brett Canipe with NCDOT regarding their anticipated request.

 We understand NCDOT may not allow the raised islands currently shown on the proposed public street. Additionally, NCDOT may not allow the proposed intersection design shown where the two proposed public streets intersect. We recommend the petitioner contact NCDOT at 980-523-0000 during the rezoning process to confirm whether they will accept the proposed design.
